



## **SUBMISSION GUIDELINES**

**Ethics and Discourse** is the philosophical journal of the International Network for Discourse Ethics (RED). It is published twice a year.

The purpose of this publication is to disseminate the discussion about discourse ethics, the transcendental and universal pragmatics and the theory of deliberative democracy by the means of articles, critical studies, discussions, translations and book reviews on topics that have an explicit link with this framework in all its expressions (this relationship can be interpretive, critical or a development of both discourse ethics itself or its more general theoretical framework etc.)

Previously published articles are accepted only in exceptional cases. The work should not be submitted simultaneously to other publications. The manuscripts will be published only if they are accepted by two external experts in a double-blind procedure.

The journal publishes papers in the following languages: Spanish, German, French, English, Italian and Portuguese.

The articles will have a length of between 5,000 and 10,000 words (including notes and bibliography), the book reviews up to 1500 words and the critical reviews a maximum of 3,000 words.

By submitting a contribution the author expresses his conformity with editorial standards, and its commitment to the basic principles of ethics of scientific publishing.

The delivery format will be: A4 size sheets, numbered, text as a Word document (.doc or .docx) or Open Office (odt), Arial, size 12 single-spaced.

The mailing must consist in a single file, which contains the article and the following documents: 1) an abstract of no more than 250 words in English, 3 to 5 keywords and their English translation, and a resume of the author of up to 120 words.

**The first page of the article** should include:

- the title of the article (uppercase, centered, Arial 12, bold, no italics or underlined); subtitle, if any (lowercase, centered, Arial 10, bold, no italics or underlined),
- first and last name of the author, his institutional affiliation, e-mail and postaddress, and
- author's resume (up to 120 words).

The **second page of the article** will include:

- the title and the subtitle of the article (with the same format as the first page),
- the abstract in English of up to 250 words,
- 3 to 5 keywords.

The **subtitles** inside the text will be placed in the left margin (Arial 10, lower case, bold, no underlining nor italics).

The **quotations** of authors and field work, as well as transcripts of interviews go inside quotation marks (no italics, bold or underlined).

**References** are placed in the main body of the text and must respect as follows: (Author's last name, year). Example: (Habermas, 1998). Literal quotations should include page/s after double point: (Habermas, 1998: 45).

The **notes** should be placed consecutively at the end of the article and before the references. (Do not use automatic placement of notes.)

**Tables**, graphics, photos and illustrations are to be sent in separate files (formats TIF, JPG or PNG), numbered in order of appearance in the text.

The **list of references** will be placed at the end of the main body of the text (or of the notes, if any), in alphabetical order, with French type bleeding, without numbering or bullets. Reference will be made only of the cited works.

- **journal articles** will follow the format: Author's last name, first name initial (year), "Title of the article", in *journal name*, volume, number, pages.  
Example: Rodríguez, D. (2010), "Ética y educación", en *Revista de ciencias sociales*, 1, 1, 107-134
- **books**: Author's last name, first name. (year), *title of the book*, city of publication: publisher  
Example: Habermas, J. (1999), *Problemas de legitimación en el capitalismo tardío*, Madrid: Cátedra

The task of **editor** or compiler will be placed in parentheses after the initial of the name.

Example: Pérez, J., A. Ramírez (eds.), *Transformación de la ciencia*, Madrid: Taurus

If necessary, clarifications of **edition number**, **translator**, etc. will be placed in parentheses after the title and before the place of publication.

Example: Kuhlmann, W. (2013), *Unhintergebarkeit* (transl. by J. Fernández), Buenos Aires: Biblos

In case of authors with two or more citations in the same year, the letters a, b, c, and so on will be used. (Example: Apel, 1985a, 1985b). In case of more than 3 authors, only the first will be cited, followed by et al.

- **chapters of books:** Author's last name, initial of first name. (year), "Title of the article/chapter", in Editor's last name, initial of first name. (ed.) *Title of the book*, city of publication: publisher, pages

Example: Wester, J. (2006), "La multidimensionalidad del concepto de responsabilidad", en D. J. Michelini et. al. (eds.), *Responsabilidad, solidaridad*, Río Cuarto: Ediciones del ICALE, 539-544

- **electronic documents** follow the same norms as the previous ones, adding always URL and date of last access.

Example: UNESCO (2005), *Constitución de la UNESCO*, disp. en <http://portal.unesco.org/en/ev.html> [02-11-2009]
